Diabetes occurs when the body cannot produce enough insulin, resulting in high levels of glucose in the blood. Blurry vision can be one of the first signs of diabetes. However, diabetes can be spotted via an eye exam even before noticeable symptoms occur. People who are diagnosed early can more easily get their diabetes under control and save money on medical expenses.

Undiagnosed high blood pressure

Without intervention, high blood pressure – also known as hypertension – can have a serious impact on many areas of the body.

When it comes to the eye, hypertension can lead to bleeding, blurred vision, hypertensive retinopathy, and even blindness. Eye doctors can see signs of hypertension in the eye by observing the thickening of blood vessels.
